The staff, students, parents, and alumni of Washburn High School are committed to having a school that:


- Offers personalized academic programs that challenge students at all level

Like virtually all urban public schools today, Washburn has faced many challenges, from overcrowded classrooms to changes in student demographics to painfully tight budgets. During the 1970s and '80s, mandated and voluntary busing, combined with students leaving the Minneapolis public schools for the suburbs or private schools, weakened many neighborhood schools.

State aid to public schools in Minnesota has declined steadily for most of the last decade. While Minneapolis voters showed their support for the city's 91 public schools by recently passing a referendum (\$60 million a year for 8 years), the school district is still projecting a budget shortfall of \$29 million in FY 2009-2010. With a multi-billion dollar state budget deficit, even greater cuts are likely in the next few years.

Challenges to provide a good education have increased as funding has declined. There are more students needing special education, who live in homes below poverty level, who enter public schools speaking little or no English—more students who enter school without adequate preparation to succeed. But teachers and administrators have dedicated themselves to meeting these challenges.

#### Washburn's Fresh Start

In 2008, Minneapolis Public Schools gave Washburn a "Fresh Start," dramatically reorganizing staff and providing extra resources to improve student performance. The Fresh Start, under the leadership of Principal Carol Markham-Cousins, provides Washburn High School the opportunity to be a leader in urban education once more, with standards as high as A.E. MacQuarrie in 1925—for today's student body in today's world.

The acclaimed International Baccalaureate (IB) program that was originated at Washburn will be returning to the school. Arts are alive with The Fall Fine Arts Kick-off, Winter Cabaret, Spring Musical, drumline, choir and band. Washburn's athletic program remains a mainstay of the school with a focus on "fitness for life," the Athletic Leadership Academy summer program, as well as teams that advance to state championships.



Washburn Neighborhood House Gatherings

Our Principal: Carol Markham-Cousins has been an educator for more than 28 years, working in several high school communities. She has served as principal at Olson Middle School in North Minneapolis and at Adams Spanish Immersion School in St. Paul. She came to Washburn High School in the fall of 2007—a return home for her. She grew up in the Washburn neighborhood and has lived the majority of her life within a three-mile radius of the school. Parents, staff, alumni and neighbors of the school have sensed a new positive energy at Washburn, evidenced daily in classrooms and hallways and regularly at athletic contests and special events. More and more families living in the area are considering Washburn as their school of choice. During the past two years there has been record attendance at the annual Fall Open House and a significant increase in enrollment is expected in fall 2009.

- Incorporating an International Baccalaureate program impacting the education of all students
- Increasing student test scores on ACT
- Increasing the number of college acceptances
- Increasing opportunities for teacher training and educational advancement
- Increasing the number of volunteers assisting students and teachers during the school day

- Increasing financial support from parents, alumni, and community residents
- Increasing financial and in-kind support from businesses and corporations
- Increasing awareness and recognition of the school in the metro community
- A renewed sense of Miller pride by the Washburn High School community
- Increasing involvement of parents and guardians

#### So, What is IB?

The International Baccalaureate (IB) offers high quality programs of international education to a worldwide community of schools. There are more than 699,000 IB students at 2,576 schools in 134 countries. The IB Diploma Programme is a challenging two-year curriculum primarily aimed at students aged 16-19. It leads to a qualification that is widely recognized by the world's leading universities.

To help sustain the new direction of the school, the Washburn High School Foundation has embarked on an ambitious and unprecedented fundraising campaign to raise needed monies for current academic programs, help with capital needs, and meaningfully add to an existing endowment fund to ensure that today's Washburn High School can provide not just a good education, but a great one—in academics, athletics and the arts.

The Foundation's campaign—"Windows of Opportunity for a New Generation"—is focused on filling the gap between adequacy and excellence in all areas of learning.

The initial priority relates to an urgent need to fund \$400,000 between now and the end of academic year 2009/2010. Most of these monies will go toward academic needs, particularly to help fund the necessary training needed for the International Baccalaureate program to be implemented at Washburn. Approximately \$50,000 will also go to both the Arts and Athletics programs.

The second priority will focus on capital improvements of the school's facilities and equipment including a much needed renovation of the auditorium.

The third priority will be to expand the capacity of the Foundation's endowment dedicated to the enhancement of educational opportunities for Washburn High School students.
